Honorary Secretary's Report

The proposals contained in the long-awaited WAG report on the traffic "blackspot" at the A466/M48 Newhouse roundabout Junction are the more obvious ones. They propose the closure of the laybys currently used for car-sharing or lorry rest-ups and/or to put a physical barrier between the lanes of traffic etc .

The Society has however always held to the view, and this does not get a mention; that the best solution would be to stop all parking at the roadside in this area and instead to provide facilities nearby on the Newhouse trading/ industrial estate for sharers and lorries etc to use, away from the dangers of this lethal junction where three fatalities have already occurred.

Another set of blackspots although of a different kind are the growing number of derelict sites in the town. We have one in Lower Church Street once the ATC hut, since demolished and now abandoned. In Hardwick Avenue the burned out cottage which, although application has been made to develop it, is still left to deteriorate as it has been for many years. More visible still is the former bungalow "The Studio" on Garden City Way next to the Port Wall; derelict, boarded up and an eyesore. Can we hope for action on any of these problems soon?
