As you will be aware, next year marks your Society's 70th anniversary and we on the Executive Committee have been considering how, if at all, the Society should change. While we appreciate that the present format seems to be working well, some of us feel that we should increase the civic role of the Society and become more involved with the modern day plans and problems of Chepstow.

To this end we are becoming involved with a number of projects affecting the town and in June your Secretary, Publications Officer and myself attended the quarterly meeting of the Monmouthshire County Council Lower Wye Area Committee. The meeting deals with Chepstow and area and this time focussed primarily on transport. It became apparent that one of the main problems was lack of communication between the Councillors and the public. I therefore emphasised to the Committee that we had monthly meetings at which, usually, between 60 and 100 members attended and that we were an ideal conduit for the decisions of the committee and the wishes of the public.

Therefore as part of our new role we propose to take a more active part in the deliberations of our Councillors and to present such deliberations to our members and relay to the Council the views of our members. Consequently we would be grateful if you would bring to our attention any local issues that concern you.



**Wednesday 5 July, 7.30pm: Marc Morris -
'The Norman Conquest - Why Did It Matter?'**

In this talk Marc Morris looks at the replacement of the ruling elite of Anglo-Saxon England, the revolution in architecture, and the introduction of new attitudes towards human life.

**Thursday 13 July, 7.30pm: James Aitcheson -
'Resistance and retribution: the aftermath
of 1066'**

James Aitcheson speaks about the years of rebellion and subjugation that followed 1066 and the role played by

William Fitz Osbern in these events. He will also discuss the challenges and rewards of researching and writing fiction set during the Norman Conquest.

**Wednesday 26 July, 7.30pm: Rick Turner -
'1067 and All That: The life and castles of
William FitzOsbern'**

William FitzOsbern was William the Conqueror's best friend and closest ally in his invasion of England. This lecture will tell his life story and identify what survives of the many castles and priories he founded and discuss if he can be credited with building Chepstow's famous Great Tower.

Hidden in the Lining – Krishna in the Garden of Assam, the tales of two textiles

**A new special exhibition in partnership with the British Museum -
at Chepstow Museum until September 3 2017**

The exhibition explores the origins, stories and meanings of wonderful silk woven temple textiles from 17th century north east India. A stunning example is remarkably in Monmouthshire Museum's own collections. To all outward appearances this is an elegant 18th century gentleman's dressing gown, known as a banyan. But hidden inside, kept from the ravages of light and wear, is a magnificent lining, made from this rare group of textiles woven in Assam, of which only about 20 examples survive today in collections around the world.
