As mentioned last month, to mark what I hope will be the start of our permanent return to the Drill Hall, I am delighted that Nancy Cavill will come and talk to us about Martha Gellhorn on 16th March.

Described as a 'trailblazer' for female journalists and a role model for women who pushed many boundaries, her association with Monmouthshire, where she lived for 14 years, is little known. The former wife of Ernest Hemingway she lived in Kilgwrrwg ,in what is now Yew Tree House but was then known as Catscradle.

The house is now marked by a plaque which is part of the Purple Plaques Cymru scheme of which I had not heard. This scheme is apparently the brainchild of Cardiff North MS Julie Morgan, supported by a cross-party group of women Senedd members and was launched in 2018. The plaques are designed to mark the achievements of women from all walks of life across Wales to help tell their inspiring stories for the next generation.



CIVIC AND AMENITY NOTES

The County Council is undertaking consultation on future arrangements for the High Street. The closing date for this initial consultation exercise is 16th March. The survey can be completed online through <u>www.monmouthshire.gov.uk/shoplocal/chepstow/</u>, and forms are available at the library. Information provided by MCC is in the box to the right. Members are urged to comment as individuals!

Separately but relatedly, there are consultations taking place on 12th March on Chepstow's "place making plan" – which overlaps with what used to be called the "place plan". – see below.



FROM MONMOUTHSHIRE CC WEBSITE:

On Wednesday 16th February 2022 a survey was launched seeking views on how residents, business and visitors currently use and would like to use Chepstow High Street and the surrounding shopping area. High Street in Chepstow has been closed to vehicles since March 2020 other than for access to the disabled parking bays on Bank Street and for deliveries between 4pm and 10am. This change was made to enable shoppers to socially distance, to support outdoor trading and to support walking and cycling. There have been wide ranging opinions on this closure, so now as the council is considering longer term options as part of the Chepstow Placemaking Plan and Active Travel proposals, it would like to gather the up-to-date feedback from as many people as possible in order to shape future plans.

No decision has been taken on the future of High Street yet. There are potentially many options including fully opening up High Street to two-way traffic 24/7, two-way traffic at restricted times, one-way traffic, restricted access or full pedestrianisation. Each option will have advantages and disadvantages which need to be fully considered. Options will require traffic modelling to assess the impact of any changes on the wider road network and this will be undertaken by traffic consultants Arup as part of their study focusing on Active Travel across Chepstow.

The Society held its latest Zoom meeting with local councillors and others on 2nd February. We had an excellent attendance, and very helpful contributions, from town and county councillors and officers.

It is likely that the 20mph speed restrictions introduced in Bulwark will be extended to other parts of the town in coming months. We now have a zebra crossing at the bottom of the High Street, which is good news.

The county council is considering how best to respond to the Welsh government's proposal that it should reduce its housebuilding targets.

Consultations are also taking place on how best to improve road access to Severn Tunnel Junction station.

It is proving difficult to get landowners to take action over the poor state of the Wales Coast Path and adjacent areas in Bulwark.

COMMITTEE NEWS

The Society's committee met in February.

It was decided that, from March, we will return to meetings in the Drill Hall.

We are very aware that some of our members will be unwilling or unable to attend – and if possible we will arrange Zoom coverage - but the general feeling was that we should now encourage attendance at physical meetings (subject of course to remaining COVID regulations).

We need to try to promote the Society more widely in the community, with a view to attracting new members.

Once physical meetings are firmly reestablished, this bulletin will revert to its previous frequency, rather than being produced monthly as it has been for the last two years.

As Angela says elsewhere in this bulletin, we reluctantly decided to increase our annual membership fee to £12, to cover increasing costs. This is subject to formal ratification at the AGM in May. We decided against having a higher membership rate for those accessing meetings via Zoom.

The next committee meeting will be on 21st April.
