# **Chris Penrose**

1938-2022



The Society has sadly lost one of its most influential and respected members with the death of Chris Penrose.

Chris was born in Newport in 1938.

His parents were both Cornish, from Truro. His early schooling was in Newport.

On leaving school he became an apprentice to the British Aeroplane company, and went to Southampton University where he obtained a degree in Aeronautical Engineering.

He spent his entire working life at Filton, Bristol, going through the changes of the aircraft industry with different companies, the final one being Rolls Royce.

The highlights there were the development of the air intake to the Bristol Olympus engines which powered Concorde, and his regular visits to Boeing aircraft company in Seattle - to the extent that, even after he had retired, Boeing contacted Filton about a problem

they had, and insisted that Chris was the only person they wanted. Rolls Royce had to persuade him out of retirement to go there.

He married Rosemary in 1966. They had two children, Tracy and Elizabeth, and a grandson Christopher, to whom Chris was especially close

He was, during his time with the Chepstow Society, its Vice President, Chairman, committee member, our representative on the Drill Hall Management Committee, and then, following the death of his wife Rosemary, our representative on the Gwent County History Society, and the external examiner of our accounts prior to submission to the Charity Commission and Customs and Revenue. His commitment to all these roles was outstanding and will be sadly missed.

Among his other activities, he was active in the U3A walking group (Strollers 2), leading walks with Rosemary, and organising and leading walking holidays both in the UK and Europe; a member of the Newport Playgoers Society, Monmouthshire Antiquarians Associations, Family History Society which took him on many occasions to Cornwall to research his family history, and Probus.

The Society's condolences go to his daughters Tracy and Liz, and his beloved grandson Christopher.

# SECRETARY'S REPORT, 2021/22

This is the end of my second year as Secretary, so again, as we come to the AGM, I would like to thank all our members and all those who help keep the Society going, in particular Geoff who is now standing down after 13 years as our Chairman.

What has the Society achieved over the last year? Well, at least we are still running, unlike many small voluntary history and amenity groups around the country. Our membership numbers have held up well despite everything.

We have maintained our regular programme of 11 monthly meetings (including a Christmas special), covering a wide range of subjects, from local ones including the war memorial, Nathaniel Wells, and sometime nearby resident Martha Gellhorn, to matters of wider interest including the history of parish churches, shopping, holiday camps, and the loss of the *Titanic*.

After a false start last autumn we are now meeting back in the Drill Hall, and though we recognise that not everyone can attend in person, I hope that we can continue to get together there, while improving how we make the talks also available via Zoom.

We have continued to make comments and provide input to the town council and others on civic and amenity issues, including the housing proposals in Monmouthshire's local plan, the Chepstow "place plan", transport studies, the High Street situation – and the new bin store in Bank Square!

We are awaiting progress on most of these, and after the local elections we will arrange more of our very useful Zoom meetings with local councillors and others. Simon's input and his regular planning update bulletins have been invaluable.

We ran our series of town walks last summer, and plan to do so again in July and August. We also arranged a visit to the *Severn Princess*, now being restored – and of course we are all extremely grateful to Keith and Sallie for the work they have put in to arranging the holiday in Kent.

As well as producing our booklet on the stories behind the town's war memorial, in its centenary year, we have continued to sell our other publications successfully, and have received several donations of books and booklets from generous members.

We are continuing to progress the possibilities for new information plaques and even a statue in the town, and hope to develop other initiatives to "stimulate public interest in, and care for, the beauty, history and character of the area", in line with our charitable objectives. New ideas are always welcome, of course!

The Society's committee has met six times over the year, and the notes are put on our website once approved. The average number at these committee meetings is now around 7, compared with about 11 some five years ago - and having fewer volunteers helping to run the Society means that we can do less than we would like.

On a more positive note, almost 700 people now follow our Facebook posts, and we hope that some of them, and those who look at the website, will become active members in the future.

As the Society approaches its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary next year, I'm confident that we will continue to play a part in informing and (hopefully) entertaining our own members, as well as in our wider roles of taking initiatives to protect and enhance our historic town and its surroundings.
