Chepstow Memories

We still aim to record some of the memories of residents who lived in the town during the 1950s, 60s and 70s, but we have had difficulty in setting up a small working group to manage the project, perhaps as people have had other priorities over the summer.

There are several people who are happy to be interviewed, or who have started to write down their memories – and several people who are willing to be interviewers.

It seems that this will be a fairly small scale project, at least initially, with no need for external funding or involvement. However, we still need to prepare and apply guidelines for those involved.

We hope that, eventually, we will be able to publish something either as a booklet or on a website.

Within the next few weeks I will be contacting those who have already shown an interest in this, to discuss the position with them and make further progress.

The Society will also arrange further displays of the exhibition material, and the old photographs of the town, that were the focus of much interest in May during our History Festival.

We expect to have another exhibition in the Drill Hall on 4th February 2024. We will also look into the town council's suggestion of showing the exhibition in the library, and we also hope to work more closely with the Palmer Centre.

All this does require more input from Society members, in helping to progress what I think all feel should be a worthwhile exercise.
