

Plans are now well advanced for the Chepstow 500 celebrations this year – including the Tudor Fair on Saturday 18th May.

We are celebrating the 500th anniversary of the charter given to the town in 1524 by the Marcher Lord, the Earl of Somerset – and of the rebuilding of the Town Arch in its current form.

There will be a Tudor Fair in the High Street, with musicians, singers, dancers, children's games, story telling, town walks, and other activities.

A Tudor re-enactment group may attempt to access the High Street from the Welsh areas outside the walls - without paying the dues required by the Lord !

To make this event a success, we <u>urgently</u> need volunteers to help on the day, and beforehand – for instance...

- To wear Tudor clothing on the day and be part of the procession
- To help with fitting and adjusting existing costumes
- To help steward the procession that will take place from St Mary's Church up to the Arch

Good news for the Drill Hall

At last, the Drill Hall roof, which in the main is over a hundred years old (possibly 150) and leaks when it rains, is to be re-covered with funding from a Welsh government grant obtained by Chepstow Town Council and top up funding from the Chepstow Town Council Itself.

The work, which has now started, is external to the building and the plan is that the Hall will remain open for all events in the planned programme.

The Hall has plans to extend the offer even further, but it is staffed by volunteers, with a paid caretaker and temporary manager, and we need more volunteers if we are going to offer more.

There has long been a suggestion to screen children's or family films at an appropriate time, possibly Saturday mornings.

Currently we have one projectionist who screens the vast majority of cinema, opera theatre and art productions.

So we are looking for some more technically minded volunteers who could assist in broadening our programme to wider sections of the community.

WALKING TOUR OF GLOUCESTER DOCKS

Meet: 09.30 Chepstow Railway Station Departure: 09.44 Return at your leisure. Please arrange your own day return rail ticket to Gloucester.

The Tour will meet at 10.45 at St Michaels Tower at the Cross in Gloucester, and will be about two hours long. It will be led by a guide from the Gloucester Civic Trust.

The Docks were conceived as early as the late 1790s and construction took a good 30 years. We will learn about difficulty in their construction, and how they helped employment in Gloucester and importantly, the impact of the Docks on the City with their link to the sea. This brought oceangoing vessels and trade to Gloucester and made it a staging post for onward traffic further upstream. The canal was the longest and widest of its time and compensation paid to slave owners after abolition was invested in building warehouses.

The cost is $\pounds 10.00$ for the guided tour, excluding train travel. No fixed return time is arranged to allow more time to experience Gloucester.



A new Exhibition on Screen film

This new Exhibition on Screen film is based on the exhibition currently showing at Tate Britain, "Sargent and Fashion", in conjunction with the Museum of Fine Arts Boston.

John Singer Sargent is known as the greatest portraitist of his era. What made his "swagger" portraits remarkable was his power over his sitters, what they wore and how they were presented to the public. With interviews with curators, contemporary fashionistas and style influencers, the film will look at how Sargent's unique practice has influenced modern art, culture and fashion.

The exhibition reveals Sargent's power to express distinctive personalities. Alongside 50 of his paintings sit stunning items of clothing and accessories in which he dressed his subjects. This was a glittering world of fashion, scandal and shameless self-promotion.

The manufacture of public identity is as controversial and contested today as it was the turn of the 20 th century, but somehow Sargent's work transcends the social noise. Explore his unique creative process and the way in which his portraits captured the spirit of a vibrant and rapidly changing age and made Sargent the painter who defined an era.
